



WHY TWU?

Trinity Western University is Canada's premier private university. TWU is a full member of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC), is recognized by the U.S. Department of Education, and is the only private Canadian university to be invited into membership in The Royal Society of Canada.

TWU is known for outstanding academics and continually receives high marks in national rankings. With an average class size of 20, students get to know their professors through classes, appointments, special events, and individual advising.

Their professors know their names, not just their ID numbers. Because TWU is a small university, students have many privileges that they would

not receive in a large institution.

In addition, TWU has a vibrant and safe learning environment and a diverse community. Students can live in residence on campus, in separate male and female dorms. With grassy areas, gardens, and massive trees, the campus provides a healthy, relaxing study environment.

Located in Langley, British Columbia, the University combines urban convenience and natural beauty. Langley is located 45 minutes from downtown Vancouver and 2.5 hours from Seattle, Washington.

International students can work on— or offcampus while studying at Trinity Western University and have an option of working in Canada for up to three years after they graduate.

COMMUNITY LIFE AT TWU

TWU Community Covenant

Every community has conduct expectations for its members. As an evangelical Christian community, Trinity Western University has established a set of behavioural responsibilities that apply to students, staff, and faculty. These responsibilities reflect the values of Trinity Western as an academic, disciple-making community. Community members are asked to comply with the University's Community Covenant as a matter of respect for these values, even though these standards may not necessarily reflect their own personal convictions.

The TWU Community Covenant involves a commitment on the part of all members to embody attitudes and to practice actions identified in the Bible as virtues, and to avoid those portrayed as destructive. Members of the TWU community, therefore, commit themselves to:

- cultivate Christian virtues, such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control, compassion, humility, forgiveness, peacemaking, mercy, and justice;
- live exemplary lives characterized by honesty, civility, truthfulness, generosity, and integrity;
- communicate in ways that build others up, according to their needs, for the benefit of all:
- treat all persons with respect and dignity, and uphold their God-given worth from conception to death;
- be responsible citizens both locally and globally who respect authorities, submit to the laws of this country, and contribute to the welfare of creation and society;
- observe modesty, purity and appropriate intimacy in all relationships, reserve sexual expressions of intimacy for marriage, and within marriage take every reasonable step to resolve conflict and avoid divorce;
- exercise careful judgment in all lifestyle



choices, and take responsibility for personal choices and their impact on others; and

 encourage and support other members of the community in their pursuit of these values and ideals, while extending forgiveness, accountability, restoration, and healing to one another.

In keeping with biblical and TWU ideals, community members are asked to voluntarily abstain from:

- communication that is destructive to TWU community life and inter-personal relationships, including gossip, slander, vulgar/obscene language, and prejudice;
- harassment or any form of verbal or physical intimidation, including hazing;
- lying, cheating, or other forms of dishonesty including plagiarism;
- stealing, misusing, or destroying property belonging to others;
- sexual intimacy that violates the sacredness of marriage between a man and a woman;
- the use of materials that are degrading, dehumanizing, exploitive, hateful, or gratuitously violent, including, but not limited to, pornography;
- drunkenness, under-age consumption of alcohol, the use or possession of illegal drugs, and the misuse or abuse of substances including prescribed drugs; and
- the use or possession of alcohol on campus or at any TWU-sponsored event, and the use of tobacco on campus or at any TWUsponsored event.



Each residence hall is divided into small groups of 14 to 22 students, peer led by a Resident Assistant (RA).
